## Memorandum to students in Fr 4110G:

### PREREQUISITES AND ANTIREQUISITES

The prerequisite for FR 4110G is one full course at the 3000 level in French literature or the equivalent or permission from the Department. Unless you have either the requisites for a course or written special permission from your Dean to enrol in it, you may be removed from the course and it will be deleted from your record.

This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

### PLAGIARISM AND CHEATING ARE SERIOUS SCHOLASTIC OFFENCES

It is assumed that students will submit assignments that are the product of their own endeavours. You should not have your written work reread or corrected by anyone other than the instructor to whom it is to be submitted. King's is committed to Academic Integrity. Students must write their essays and assignments in their own words. Whenever students take an idea, or a passage from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing, such as, footnotes or citations. ### MEDICAL AND NON-MEDICAL ABSENCES

If you miss a test or exam due to illness, please see the university policy on Accommodation for Medical Illness (<https://studentservices.uwo.ca/secure/index.cfm>). According to this policy, students seeking academic accommodation on medical grounds for any missed tests, exams, participation components and/or assignments worth 10% or more of their final grade must apply to the Academic Dean's office and provide documentation. Academic accommodation cannot be granted by the instructor or department. Please note that in this course, this same requirement will also apply to assignments worth less than 10% of the final grade.

Non-medical absences are to be discussed with the instructor prior to a test unless there is an emergency situation that prevents you from attending. Make-up tests will be scheduled only in cases where there are legitimate reasons for the absence (note: going on holiday, attending celebrations, working, sleeping in, are not legitimate reasons to miss a test).

### ATTENDANCE

Attendance is obligatory in class. The *Academic Calendar* very clearly states that a student may be debarred from writing the final examination if he or she is, in the opinion of the instructor, absent too frequently from class or laboratory periods in any course. He or she will be reported to the dean (after due warning has been given).

The participation mark is not an attendance mark, but it is clear that if the student is not in class, he or she will be unable to participate.

### ASSIGNMENTS AND ORAL PRESENTATIONS

a) Procedure for submitting assignments:

All assignments must be submitted **in class in person** to the professor on the day they are due. The professor does not accept assignments submitted via the late-essay drop-off box or in any electronic form (such as e-mail attachments or included in the body of an e-mail). If you can't be in class the day the assignment is due, you must make arrangements to submit the essay in person before class to the professor. There will be no exceptions to this policy except for medical emergencies.

No late assignments will be accepted.

Extensions will be granted in exceptional circumstances only, and extensions must be arranged **before** the due date. No extensions will be considered after the due date. See section above on medical absences. You must make and retain a copy of all assignments submitted.

b) Format of written assignments

The text of assignments must be printed in Times Roman, Times New Roman, or a similar font, in 12-point type on plain white paper. All margins must be 2.5 cm (1 inch). Accents must be computer generated.

c) Oral presentations are to be presented the date indicated. There will be no rescheduling of presentations except in documented emergencies. The professor must be informed before the class if the student cannot be there for a scheduled exposé.

**CONDUCT IN CLASS**

It is expected that students will conduct themselves in a manner appropriate to the classroom. “Chatting” with your friends is distracting to the professor and to the students around you and will not be tolerated. You will be asked to leave the classroom to continue your discussion elsewhere.

Please do not eat during class. This is as much a distraction as chatting with your friends.

**USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES IN CLASS**

The use of computers, cell phones, personal listening devices, and all other electronic and communication equipment will not be permitted during **in-class tests, quizzes, or assignments**.

Students are expected to use computers responsibly during class time.

**Cell phones are to be turned OFF during class and put away.**
